- Small town in Dumfries & Galloway, known for its deep historical and religious significance.
- Population of around 850.
- Cradle of Christianity; first recorded Christian Church in the country founded by St Ninian in the 5<sup>th</sup> Century.
- Towns layout shaped by its medieval past, with a central street lined with traditional buildings, dating back several centuries.
- Rural community attracting visitors for its strong historical identity, religious history & archaeology.
- Located on the Machars peninsula, offering beautiful coastal scenery, walks, cycling and a quiet escape.



# Community Development Trust Established 2014

Board made up of seven volunteer trustees, living in the Whithorn & District Community Council boundary and committed to the charity's aims and objectives.



Community filmed consultation in 2013 reflecting on past, present and future of Whithorn. Pride in local heritage but concerns for options for young people; employment and income. Ambitions for better intergenerational working and for opportunities to come together in **sports** and **events**.

## Our Projects; The New Town Hall

- The New Town Hall is a Victorian building on St Johns Street in Whithorn, built in 1885 as a public gathering space and closed by Dumfries & Galloway Council, we undertook a Community Asset Transfer of the building, only once we had full funds in place in April 2021 to refurbish the building and transform into a state-of-the-art community hub. We then hired our first staff in summer of 2022 as building works neared completion.
- The award winning Bravehearts Boxing Club now have their own dedicated gym and train three nights a week. New ladies class.
- Fitness Suite opened in January 2023; now with approx. 200
  members. Fully accessible to all with a lift and changing facilities
  with showers. Key cards allow easy access to members.
- Main hall can be sub-divided into three spaces with large video screen for conferencing, meetings, parties, clubs, dance classes, dog training, youth club, drugs and alcohol service.
- Four study carrells allowing computer access for those having trouble getting online, for printing and assistance with online forms etc also used by teachers for remote learning, supporting pupils who are finding school challenging.



## The hall as a community hub space;

- The hall was designed to be as functional and flexible a space as
  possible, with three distinct areas which could be sectioned into rooms
  or opened out into the full hall. Full kitchen facilities too.
- We have held farmers markets, wedding & Christmas fayres, ceilidhs, birthday parties, coronation celebrations, local flower show, local film premieres, discos, our first (in 2023) and second (in 2024) beer and cheese festivals, school concerts, bingo nights, tea dances, pantomimes, breakfast with Santa & many more events......
- We were also the Whithorn & District Resilience Group warm hub during Storm Eowyn in January 2025, providing hot food, showers, phone charging & use of our laundry & kitchen facilities.
- We have provided free lunches for school children over the summer holidays in 2023 when over 600 lunches were provided and in 2024/25 Food Friday; providing delicious lunches free to all, an essential service in combating social isolation, loneliness and sign posting people to other services when needed. Over 150 local people of all ages attend weekly!





# The New Town Hall Bunkhouse

18 beds across 5 rooms, all en-suite, 4 star-rated hostel new build to rear of the New Town Hall, accessible room with shower room, e-bike chargers, cycle storage, bike repair station, shared kitchen/dining & laundry facilities. Opened in March 2023.

# Background & conception



The bunkhouse was custom built, in the place of a demolished Victorian supper room. It was built to provide accommodation at the end of the Whithorn Way 146 mile route from Glasgow. The All Roads Lead to Whithorn Trust did extensive research into bunkhouses; their facilities, layout and pricing before creating the final design, the hope is that the income from the bunkhouse subsidises the community hub. The bunkhouse is heated by an air source heat pump and is super insulated with triple glazed windows.

#### Bunkhouse success

- We opened the bunkhouse in March 2023. Bookings have more than doubled from 2023 to 2024. Hopeful of 2025!
- Bookable through booking.com, free-to-book and directly through our website, phone, email, or walk-ins.
- We have had bookings from all over the world Canada, Australia, America, Spain, China, Japan, Italy, Poland, Hungary, Africa, Germany, India, the Netherlands, Belgium and a party of 16 French students with their teachers.
- Recently a group of female wild swimmers from Yorkshire & had groups of motor-cyclists and many cyclists (including a famous rugby player). Along with travel bloggers, Duke of Edinburgh Award student groups and youth work groups.
- We have achieved a 4-star rating through a secret stay with Visit Scotland, and are proud supporter members of the Galloway & Southern Ayrshire Biosphere & are fully certified. We're members of the South of Scotland Destination Alliance.
- We are constantly learning and evaluating our offering & have made changes to make all more functional & comfortable.
- We are extremely proud to say we have had overwhelmingly good reviews so far and we really hope to keep the momentum going with new changes, ideas and additions.
- Our bunkhouse book with local facilities has been well received and local walk cards that can be borrowed, enjoyed.

# Other projects;




#### Former Grapes Hotel; 10-12 George Street, Whithorn;

A Georgian C Listed building dating back to 1800 and lain as an empty shell in Whithorn's outstanding conservation area for 30 years, we purchased the former hotel in 2020 and undertook a full re-fit in 2021 creating affordable community owned housing, energy efficient with high levels of insulation, secondary double glazing and air source heat pumps.

Working with South of Scotland Community Housing who undertook the housing needs and demands survey initially and then facilitated the allocations process; the two 3- bedroom affordable houses were offered to two local families at Christmas 2021. The housing has indeed proven to provide modern living and affordable to heat.

The Scottish Empty Homes Partnership awarded the project the 'Best Use of Empty Homes Work to Create Social/Affordable Housing' in 2023; for strong contribution to increasing supply of social/affordable housing.

# Other Projects;



The extension to the Whithorn Way; 15 kms of high quality, accessible, additional paths & routes created for walkers and cyclists, locals and visitors in 2022! Connecting Whithorn to St Ninian's Cave allowing pilgrims to trace the steps of those who, since the 8<sup>th</sup> Century have journeyed to the sacred site.














- We're also developing another extension to the Whithorn














## Key takeaways
